atch them walk in the footsteps of Jules Verne! For children, the Aronnax tour is like a treasure hunt. For you, this is the ideal walk: a relaxed introduction to Amiens. Along the way, do some scouting for the rest of your stay: Jules Verne's House, the Musée de Picardie, the cathedral (seen from afar), and much more. As you walk, you'll discover opportunities for shopping, as well as the perfect places to satisfy your appetite: the organic and local burgers at Eden Burger are sure to delight everyone.

Of course, you'll have to take them to the **Amiens Zoo**. Without a doubt, you'll melt at the sight of a red panda, a meerkat or an otter, applaud the sea lions and post snaps of the tigers on Instagram. But more than that, along the way, your children will learn plenty about biodiversity (and maybe you will too). And to compare your top three favourite animals, don't hesitate to take a seat at the Le Pavillon Bleu – a beautiful spot with great food, right next to the zoo (no need to ague for hours about who wants to eat what and where).

Are your children curious about nature? Are they thirsty for culture? Or both? We have the answer for you. Set sail for **the Hortillonnages**. On foot, by bike or on the water, depending on how energetic you're feeling. No matter your choice, you'll discover a secret and restorative archipelago – unique in its kind. From May to October, you'll be able to tick off all the boxes of nature, culture and adventure in one go as you discover **the International Garden Festival**, from island to island on

board your electric boat. In summer, you can also go above and beyond and exert yourself at Saint-Pierre Park: pedalo race, family mini-golf competition or a dizzying zip-line descent ...


Have you ever seen a real mummy? A copy of the Raft of Medusa (even brighter than the original)? The Musée de Picardie is like the Louvre, but cooler. It offers extraordinary collections covering the whole history of art, to be discovered at your own pace, in your own way – for scholars and amateurs alike. Little ones can enjoy drawing, while older kids tackle puzzles, and parents settle on the benches to daydream in front of their favorite painting.

In Amiens, we take our afternoon snack seriously! If you're looking for something healthy, head to Colibri restaurant; if you're looking for something cosy, go to Maxime; and for something tasty, try DASI. We also have several excellent crêperies to offer. With your batteries recharged, you can walk to Saint-Leu to laugh together at the antics of **the Cabotans** – traditional Amiens puppets.

And if your children are a little older, you can even offer them the urban **ICONIC** art tour around Saint-Leu or a little Wake Board tour in **Amiens Cable Park** (between ski-lift and surfing, you have to see it to understand).

Finally, if, despite all this, they're still not tired, take them to **CHROMA**. This is an unforgettable experience to enjoy with family at night, in summer (before going to bed) or in December (after Christmas market).






AMIENS MÉTROPOLE ZOOLOGICAL GARDEN

Dedicated to protecting biodiversity, Amiens Zoo runs conservation programs, supports scientific research, and educates an ever-growing audience about the environmental issues facing our planet. Originally a botanical garden, the Amiens Zoo is a 7-hectare haven of greenery with winding waterways, home to nearly 700 animals. For those looking for something to eat, you can stop by the Pavillon Bleu, a romantic 19th-century riverside open-air café.

Don't miss out: summer evenings, after-work events where you can enjoy the zoo at twilight (it also applies to those who haven't worked that day!).


THE HOUSE OF **JULES VERNE**

Jules Verne lived in this this 19th-century mansion, nicknamed the Tower House, for 18 years and wrote most of his Extraordinary Voyages here. Discover his imaginary world and daily life. More than 700 objects evoke the personality, sources of inspiration and memories of Jules Verne.

And what could be better than to visit the house with Jules Verne himself, his publisher, his wife or a character straight out of one of his novels: Passepartout, Princess Aouda, or perhaps even Robur the Conqueror, who prefers to be known as «Master of the World»...

ARONNAX TRAIL

The Aronnax Trail is a 19-stop walking tour that highlights key locations tied to the creative genius and imagination of Jules Verne, both in the heart of Amiens and at Le Crotoy. Designed to be family-friendly and accessible to all, the trail offers a literary, cultural, and tourist experience. Thanks to QR codes installed on bilingual panels, visitors can enjoy immersive videos, actor-read excerpts from Verne's novels, quizzes for younger participants, and a few surprises along the way. Jules Verne's connection to Amiens began in May 1856 when he met Honorine Deviane, who would become his wife. He settled in the city in 1871, becoming a deeply involved member of the community. Not only did Verne live in Amiens, but he also joined numerous associations and served as a local councillor for sixteen years. He was even a member of the Académie d'Amiens. As you'll discover throughout this walking tour, Verne's life in Amiens was deeply significant. The city not only inspired him but also made appearances in several of his stories.

NATURALLY ROMANTIC

Life as a couple is not (always) plain sailing. Whether you've already experienced many storms together or your journey as a couple just started, the little Venice of the North has everything you need for a romantic weekend getaway.

et your luggage down in a cottage in the heart of the Hortillonnages, a room in the town or a chic hotel. Of course, you can stay in bed, but you could also set off for a stroll in the beautiful district of Henriville, starting your romantic walk in front of the church of Saint-Martin (romantic in the 19th century sense of the word, but also like something out of a Hugh Grant film).

Make your way down slowly to **Jules Verne's House**, the Boulevard Jules Verne and Jules-Verne Circus (this great and omnipresent writer was also a great lover of Amiens ... and of Honorine). Take a break at the **Musée de Picardie** – you've got the time. Love is everywhere, from the "Billet doux" (Love Letter) to "L'amour tourmentant l'âme" (Love Tormenting the Soul), to the basements where the Rivery Priapus is hidden (you'll either love it or you'll hate it). You might even be tempted to come back in the early evening for a "Night Tour": a torchlit tour, both intriguing and intimate.

Hand in hand, get an eyeful before the Dewailly Clock's «Naked Mary» and then, as Saint-Exupéry would say, look together in the same direction: **Notre-Dame Cathedral** presents itself to you. Take the time to get to know it and settle onto one of the benches in the Parc de l'Évêché, which is ideal for confessions ranging from the most tender (like summer nights in the luminous setting

of **CHROMA**) to the most spectacular (such as the enterprising Duke of Buckingham throwing himself at the feet of the powdered Anne of Austria). The most enthusiastic will prefer the 307 steps of the Cathedral's towers, to treat themselves – out of breath and not far from the seventh heaven – to a loving selfie.

Cobbled streets, a drink by the water, a kiss stolen on the bridge of the Dodane: soak up the Dolce Vita in **Saint-Leu**. For those who cannot live only on love and fresh water, we could not recommend the Le Quai restaurant highly enough – for its cuisine service and the view (or, if you're looking for a slightly different vibe, enjoy a snack in a convivial atmosphere next door at Le Port Saint-Leu).

Next, discover why they call our city the Little Venice. Hop on board a boat to venture into the natural maze of the Hortillonnages or play it safe by hiring the services of a boatman (here, they do not sing - or if they do, it's in Picard). Mysterious islands, lush gardens and wildlife, a timeless moment far from the raging crowd and hustle and bustle of everyday life - you will remember these moments for a lifetime. Or if you're not keen on water, head to the La Madeleine Cemetery. Hilly and wooded, it's sure to charm with its poetic atmosphere sometimes fantastic, but always oh so romantic.




PARC DE L'ÉVÊCHÉ

JULES-VERNE CIRCUS

This is one of the last permanent circuses in France! Its wooden version, inaugurated in 1889, was considered the most important provincial circus thanks to its 3,000 seats. Completely renovated in 2003, it took the name of Jules Verne, its most fervent defender at the time of its construction This architectural gem has welcomed the most prestigious Circus families and has been chosen as a filming location by some of the greatest film-makers, such as Federico Fellini or Jean-Jacques Beineix. What's for sure is that its metallic architecture, imagined by Émile Ricquier, and its painted decoration by the contemporary artist Ernst Caramelle form a surprising alliance ... Today, we can visit it and, most importantly, marvel at its varied programming (circus, street arts, equestrian shows, music and more) staged by internationally recognised companies or by the great artists of tomorrow.




THE MADELEINE CEMETERY

The Père Lachaise of Amiens! The Madeleine Cemetery was created in 1796, developed as a romantic park. It is one of the most beautiful landscape cemeteries in France.

Remarkable trees mark the paths and invite visitors to walk and discover, as it stretches out over more than 18 hectares. The tombs of the great Amiens families testify to the city's prosperity in the 19th century.

The alleys of the Madeleine Cemetery can be discovered with a tourist guide from March to October.



PICTURESQUE SAINT-LEU DISTRICT

In the Middle Ages, the streets of the Saint-Leu district resonated with the sound of 25 mills, powered by the arms of the Somme. Millers, dyers and weavers all got to work grinding grain, crushing woad leaves and beating fabrics. From this prosperous period, the magic of the canals and the charm of the colourful wood and cob façades remain today. The lapping waves, the historical riches and the poetic atmosphere all invite you to enjoy a timeless walk. Under the benevolent eye of Notre-Dame, the flowered terraces of the cafés and restaurants of Quai Bélu and Place du Don offer up the perfect setting for a romantic date.

GUILT-FREE PLEASURES

ut, when nothing subsists of an old past [...] alone, frailer but more enduring, more immaterial, more persistent, more faithful, smell and taste still remain for a long time, like souls, remembering, waiting, hoping, on the ruin of all the rest, bearing without giving way, on their almost impalpable droplet, the immense edifice of memory.» »

These are the words of Marcel Proust (who said it much better than any of us), but we've all experienced it – whether with a madeleine or a macaron. From our trips, we always take home memories of food. That dish we ordered, not knowing what to expect. The divine surprise of a little restaurant that didn't look like much from the outside. The kindness of the waiter. That flavour you could never find anywhere else. So, to ensure that your stay creates its very own fireworks display in your limbic system (the centre of emotions and pleasure in our brains), we've pulled out all the stops.

HERE & NOW

The chefs of Amiens offer a cuisine of their time, with local products according to the seasons. This is true of Thomas Dumont at Hyacinthe, a dedicated chef who knows each of his growers and vegetables by name, as well as of Stéphane Bruyer at l'Ail des Ours, whose menu changes as much according to his boundless inspiration as it does to his daily harvest, or of the restaurant Instinct, where the vibrant cuisine showcases innovative flavors.

And it's not just a man's game: Claire Chaumeil at Robin Room and Café Pinson offers a meat or vegetarian menu, always tasty and never out of touch and Margot Servoisier, on the other hand, sweetens her organic and vegan pastries with honey from the Hortillonnages ...

TRADITION & CREATION

Gâteau battu, duck pâté, macarons ... So many unmissable delights from the Amiens repertoire, which you'll have no trouble finding during your stay, whether in one of our delicious eateries or in the shops. Without

a doubt, you'll be surprised to be served a Ficelle Picarde with fries, or to see that the Amiens andouillette looks nothing like how you imagined it.

In any case, you'll discover a rich and flavourful culinary repertoire, just waiting to be rediscovered. Many Amiens artisans are committed to bringing these traditions to life, and even reinventing them. It is in this spirit that Julien Planchon offers up his creations at the Belfry market hall: Picardy tricorne (raw-milk cheese matured with a homemade beer), salicornia tomme, wild-garlic butter and more. Just beside him, Daniel Héripré is both the guardian of the duck pâté temple and the inventor of the white pudding with gâteau battu or the Antan pork sausage with tomme au foin. You're sure to melt for Jean Torgneux's unmissable Amiens macaron. Enjoy this sweet little almond biscuit on the terrace, in an incredible date with the Notre-Dame. And how could we forget Ambiani and Charles & Vianney, who bring our regional brewing tradition back to life in the form of beers with evocative names and original flavours?

EXCELLENCE & GENEROSITY

Who could be better than Frédéric Barette, at Les Orfèvres, or Eric Boutté, at l'Aubergade, to embody the soul of Amiens gastronomy? Each in their own style reflects a precise and inventive cuisine, going out of their way to surprise us or, instead, to offer us a date with the unmissable haddock ravioli or the «real cabbage stuffed leaf by leaf with a traditional foie-gras filling».

Nicolas Medkour at Quai, trained by top chefs in gastronomy, excels in all culinary styles, from bistronomy to haute cuisine.

Looking to gather even more flavorful and aromatic experiences? Let's not forget the brasseries (Chez Jules, les Bouchées doubles, l'Horloge, la Coupole...) or the bistros like le Capuccino, the quick-service restaurant like Petits délices entre amis... Yes that's a lot to choose from. But don't worry, good memories don't add any extra pounds!

THE GÂTEAU BATTU

The gâteau battu is a Picardy institution. Somewhere between a cake and a brioche, it's rich in eggs and butter (let's face it). Its pastry is nevertheless airier and softer than traditional brioche (and boom!). It's baked in a high, cylindrical, fluted mould, giving it the shape of a chef's hat. We recommend you snap it up quickly, as its life expectancy is no more than a snack.

THE FICELLE PICARDE

Everyone knows (or thinks they know) this classic of Picardy cuisine: a crêpe, a thin slice of ham, mushroom duxelles ... The Compagnons de la Ficelle Picarde association keeps a watchful eye on this speciality. However, that hasn't stopped the somewhat rebellious people of Amiens from reinterpreting it. Be careful though, there is a red line that must not be crossed: no béchamel. The secret of the Ficelle Picarde (the real one, of course) is crème fraîche.

AMIENS DUCK PÂTÉ

Amiens duck pâté was created in 1643. This tasty speciality takes the form of a meat pie, with a few passionate craftsmen perpetuating this great tradition today. With a delicious melt-in-the-mouth texture, you can serve it as a gourmet starter with a small Hortillonnages salad, or even take it away for a chic picnic.

THE AMIENS MACARON

The Amiens macaron is a Picardy speciality recognised since the 16th century. What makes it unique is a traditional recipe based on almond, sugar, eggs and honey, without colouring (so completely unlike the Parisian macaron;-) Just like its partner the chocolate tile, this sweet and slightly addictive cookie is the ideal companion for a coffee break at the foot of the cathedral.

THE BELFRY MARKET HALL: THE MEETING PLACE OF AMIENS GASTRONOMERS

A real village in the heart of the city, the Belfry Market Hall is a covered market that brings together traders recognised for their fresh, top-quality products: cheesemongers, bakers, pastry makers, market gardeners, butchers, fishmongers, caterers and wine merchants, all promoting tradition and taste. Here, you'll find everything you need to prepare a traditional local meal – as well as products from further afield.

L'ÎLE AUX FRUITS

L'Île aux Fruits is an organic vegetable farm in the heart of Amiens, on one of the many rivers dotted along the Somme river. Here, we grow fruits and vegetables, following the principles of permaculture. However, every Thursday evening, L'Île aux Fruits also becomes a market packed full of producers and their local products, craftsmen and their creations from the area and concerts of local musicians ... A real illustration of the Amiens art of living.

WATERFRONT MARKET

In the shade of the trees, here, you'll meet friendly local producers and end up taking home a basket overflowing with: fruits and vegetables (from the Hortillonnages, of course), as well as traditional bread and jams, local beers and cheeses to go with them, honey and gingerbread for those with a sweet tooth, bisteux tarts, ficelles, Vimeu snails and traditionally reared pork. Put simply, life itself!

BEERS, WINES AND SPIIRITS!

Here, we offer some excellent craft beers that really stand out. Whether it's Lafleur, Bear'maid, or the Blanche d'Amiens, each one has its own story to tell. And did you know that in the Somme, we also produce great wine? From Chardonnay and Pinot Noir in the vineyards of La Cour de Bérénice to the 50^{ème} Parallèle, the latest release from Collectif Les 130, Northern wines are becoming increasingly popular and could be the trend in the coming years!

For those who enjoy spirits and traditional craftsmanship, Hautefeuille's range of whiskies and gins, made from barley grown right here in Picardy, will delight even the most discerning palates. Awarded at the Concours général agricole, these exceptional drinks are sure to find their way into your glasses!

Remember, excessive alcohol consumption is dangerous for your health.





AMIENS IS A PARTY

ow long has it been since you've gone out? When did you last really let loose, forget about work, find your friends and, sometimes, even find yourself? For all those forced to count the months (or years) on their fingers, Amiens offers a simple and effective solution: a weekend with friends.

Okay, we can't find your friends for you. Although ... As you make your way along the water, whether in the festive **Saint-Leu district**, in an open-air café along **the towpath** or at L'Île aux Fruits, you'll find that in Amiens we quickly make friends: music, local beers and sharing platters can help.

When it comes to culture, that should do it too: open bar at the **Musée de Picardie**, full of beauties to consume without moderation, à la carte theatrical evenings at the **Cultural Centre** and the **Comédie de Picardie Theatre**, or wild nights at the **Lune des Pirates** (a concert hall that's small by size but mighty in enthusiasm).

Otherwise, June is the month of festivals in Amiens – with plenty of them: Les Tentaculaires (Street Arts), Minuit avant la Nuit (Current music in the heart of nature) and the Rendez-vous de la Bande Dessinée comics- festival (an old industrial hall full of exhibitions and, above all, artists). Two things are shared by all of our events: first-rate programming and an incredibly friendly atmosphere.

Between May and October, we present the International Garden Festival: about fifty landscape works in the heart of the Hortillonnages, to be discovered on foot and by electric boat (our alternative to scooters).

In summer, it's time for **CHROMA**, a monumental experience that brings colour back to the cathedral (and much more), the **Voyage au Coeur de l'Été** (world dance and music, so get practising your chassés) or **Un été à Amiens** (sports, outdoor cinema and concerts – in short, everything for a perfect holiday).

In autumn, discover the IC.ON.IC festival of Visual Arts (to be discovered in the streets and galleries of Amiens), the International Film Festival (with 400 films on the programme, you're sure to find something of interest).

Throughout the month of December, CHROMA returns (just in front of the restaurant) while, in the city centre, one of the largest Christmas markets in France is unveiled (so large that you'll need several snack breaks to discover it).

Discover the true meaning of party on match days too! Head to "La Licorne" to support Amiens SC, to the Coliseum to cheer on the Gothiques (the ones playing ice hockey, not the ones dressed all in black) or make your way to the Racecourse: we bet you'll have a very cool and vintage evening.

Normally, in a weekend, you'll have shared more laughter than you have in the last six months, forgotten your complicated relationship with Hervé from accounting and published your share of stories for the year. But, just in case, remember that the FRAC Picardie offers some of the best exhibitions of contemporary art in Europe, that the Perret Tower (highest skyscraper in Europe at the time of its construction!) is particularly photogenic at night, and that the plates of our chefs are eminently Instagrammable, in addition to being inventive, based on local products and, incidentally, delicious.

And if you can't find the friends with whom to share all this, come and see us at the Tourist Office, right next to the cathedral: we'll discuss it over a coffee.



MINUIT AVANT LA NUIT

IN JUNE

Minuit avant la Nuit is a festival like no other, held just before summer in unique places between the grass and the water. In a veritable invitation to travel, Minuit avant la Nuit leads us into a magical world where artists escape in boats to the islets of the Hortillonnages, for intimate concerts where the venue becomes an actor in its own right. At the Saint-Pierre Park, the atmosphere of the concerts is more intense and more festive too, but always cool and good natured.


LE FRAC PICARDIE HAUTS-DE-FRANCE

Founded in 1983 and based in Amiens, le Fonds Régional d'Art Contemporaine (FRAC, the Regional Fund for Contemporary Art) of Picardie is the only Frac to have built a collection focused on contemporary drawing, one of the largest in France and Europe. Today, it holds over 1,300 works by 250 artists, showcasing the diverse expressions of contemporary drawing, including iconic figures from the French and international art scene such as Pierrette Bloch, Jean-Michel Albérola, Giuseppe Penone, William Kentridge, Sol LeWitt, and Jean-Michel Basquiat.



through lockdown. We have the climate seen deteriorate. Digital has taken over almost everything. And so we aspire to something else. Something simple, something real. Nature the way it is, and authentic people to meet. This experience, rich in emotions and low in carbon, offers itself up to you in Amiens.

Start by landing, at the Les Cygnes campsite or in a cabin, on an island in the **Hortillonnages**. In Amiens, water is everywhere. It offers up the perfect environment for daydreaming, outings and tours, by boat, kayak, paddleboard, bike or simply on foot. Our 300 hectares of floating gardens can be discovered in a solo adventure or guided by a Hortillon market gardener with plenty of interesting stories to share with you.

Nature is also present where you might not expect it. With Sabine Robin, passionate about history and with a PhD in pharmacy, you'll discover the plants that surround us in the smallest corners of the city, along with all their virtues and legends.

What's more, the gardens of Amiens can't wait to tell your their story. At **Saint-Acheul**, the story is that of humanity, at the **Botanical Garden**, it is the tale of the infinite variety of species and their uses, and at the **Hotoie** and **Saint-Pierre** it is of the sweetness of life in one of the greenest cities in France. Even our cemeteries are gardens: lose yourself in their tree-lined alleys where you'll meet the fathers of Bécassine and Phileas Fogg and, with a little luck, a few squirrels.

In terms of wildlife, the 700 animals of the Amiens Métropole **Zoo** are a great place to start: 7 hectares of water and greenery, calm and nature, as well as conservation and the promotion of biodiversity. The animals of the **Ferme d'Antan** farm, on the edge of the great Creuse forest, are a little more old

school than the star sea lions at the zoo, but no less adorable. With the help of farmers, you'll also discover rural traditions and learn how to make bread and butter for a fantastic day out.

In Amiens, our heroes don't wear capes, they grow vegetables. If you want to meet them in real life, head to Rivery to explore the Hortillonnages Museum, embodied loud and clear by Thérèse and René, do your shopping right next door on Friday nights at Jean-Louis' L'Hortillon de Lune, or on Saturday morning at the traditional market on the water, a tradition preserved from long ago when the Hortillon market gardeners descended the Somme on their barque à cornet (horn-shaped boat) loaded with vegetables. There, you'll find oldfashioned bread from a young baker, Ficelles Picardes from a talkative butcher, duck pâté from a cheeky farmer, organic market gardeners and local vegetables, cheeses and honey, apples and cider. You will also meet chefs, many of whom work with fresh and local products.

A quick pedal away, you'll be welcomed as friends on the cosy terrace of the lockhouse of Picquigny and enjoy the breathtaking view of the Somme and the castle. A true ode to slow living and silence, embark on one of the Nièvre and Somme Tourist Office's electric boats for a ride along the water, punctuated by a tasting of local products.

And for memories that cannot be eaten (and that haven't been around the world in 80 containers)? At the **Musée de Picardie**, we offer you scarves dyed with woad (the dye plant upon which Amiens' fortune was built in the Middle Ages) and soaps carved with the effigy of Amiens monuments from the Savonnerie des Hauts-de-France. But what you'll take home is much more valuable: the feeling of having travelled in a different way, respecting nature and people (and, most likely, the desire to set off again).





INTERNATIONAL GARDEN FESTIVAL -HORTILLONNAGES AMIENS

A unique natural and cultural experience. At the heart of the Floating Gardens of Amiens, Les Hortillonnages, experience some fifty creations by landscapers, architects, artists and designers around the world. Their works, which can be poetic or comic, but are always startling, question our relationship with the environment in a recreational way. The itinerary from island to island, in a small boat, can be done autonomously or with an English-speaking guide.



LE BEFFROI (THE BELFRY)

Registered as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in July 2005 alongside the 23 belfries of Nord-Pas de Calais and Picardy, the Amiens belfry has stood strong since the Middle Ages. It symbolises the independence of the municipality of Amiens from the Comtal power. Originally serving as the City Hall, it is best known for its time as a prison. An ascent of one hundred steps gives way to the terrace, which offers a panoramic view of the city and the 18th-century bell tower. Discover the story of the Belfry in the company of a tourist guide qualified by the Ministry of Culture.



THE WAYS OF SAINT JAMES

In May 2018, two studs representing «Mont Saint-Michel» and «Santiago de Compostela» were embedded to mark the starting point of a new route between Amiens and Rouen.

This Way forms part of a route that runs from Bruges to Santiago. In Amiens, walkers or cyclists can choose from the Paris, Beauvais or Rouen routes.

THE BATTLEFIELDS OF THE SOMME AND THE REMEMBRANCE CIRCUIT

The Somme suffered greatly during the First World War, with the infamous Battle of the Somme in 1916. The wounds of the Great War are still visible today, more than 90 years later: trenches, mine holes, destroyed vegetation and even completely razed villages. The main sites (memorials, ruins, museums, cemeteries) can be discovered by following the Remembrance Circuit, connecting Albert and Péronne.

ANZAC DAY

EVERY 25 APRIL

Every year, at the end of April, Australians and New Zealanders visit the Somme to commemorate ANZAC Day in memory of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps that landed on the Gallilpoli Peninsula in Turkey on 25 April 1915, and which distinguished itself during the battles of the Somme, particularly at Villers-Bretonneaux. On 25 April 1918, after intense fighting, Australian Brigade Number 13, led by General Glasgow and based south of Villers-Bretonneaux, and General Elliott's Brigade No 15 from the north of the city repelled the Germans and joined forces. Villers-Bretonneux was released on the anniversary of the defeat of Gallipoli. The Battle of Villers-Bretonneaux ended the German offensive launched in March and saved Amiens from occupation.

THE SIR JOHN MONASH CENTRE


Open since 25 April 2018, the centenary of the Battle of Villers-Bretonneux, the Sir John Monash Centre is a key location on the Australian Way of Remembrance on the Western Front. Located on the site of the Australian National Memorial and adjacent to the Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery, this centre recounts the Australian experience on the Western Front through a series of interactive multimedia installations and immersive experiences.


UNDERGROUND CITY OF NAOURS

The Underground City of Naours hides a whole host of secrets! For centuries, Picardy suffered a series of wars and invasions, forcing villagers to seek refuge. The quarries, then used for the extraction of chalk for drawdown or construction, would serve as shelters for the inhabitants, their property, their livestock and their crops. From these quarries, entirely dug by hand, true underground refuges (mûches in the Picard language) would be born. At its peak, the Underground City of Naours featured 28 galleries and 300 rooms. Falling into oblivion after the 17th century, the underground was rediscovered in 1887 by Abbé Danicourt and later welcomed many Allied soldiers during the First World War. The latter would leave their graffiti on the walls of the City, a raw testimony imbued with emotions.
